POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION

COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

Colleges offer career-focused programs leading to jobs in technology, health, business, hospitality, tourism and other occupations. Certificate programs usually require one year of study. Diploma programs require two or three years of full-time study. For more information about Ontario colleges, visit ontariocolleges.ca

Universities offer academic undergraduate (bachelor's) and graduate (master's and PhD) programs in arts and sciences, as well as professional programs in education, medicine, dentistry, law and engineering. Generally, a high school or secondary school diploma is required for admission to either a college or a university. If you did not graduate from high school, you may be able to apply as a mature student based on your experience. Mature students must be 19 years or older and a Canadian citizen or permanent resident.
