Orientation to Ontario

YOUTH

There are many special services for children, teenagers and young adults in Ontario. Many organizations and government agencies provide assistance with education. employment, volunteering, health, and social issues.

- NewYouth.ca is an online community for newcomer youth with information on school, work, health and immigration. It also lists events for young people across the province and lists a number of scholarships, grants and bursaries available to newcomer youth newyouth.ca
- Youth Opportunities Ontario provides information on employment, education, social programs and volunteering across the province youthconnect.ca

EDUCATION

Youth in Ontario must attend school until the age of 18, or until they have completed a high school diploma. There are different educational paths available in Ontario. High schools in Ontario cannot ask you for your immigration status when you enroll.

The high school Cooperative Education (co-op) program allows students to earn credit towards

their diploma while gaining work experience. Co-op students can also begin an apprenticeship in the trades through the Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP) ontario.ca or findlink.at/oyap

Ontario has over 40 publically funded colleges and universities. There are also more than 400 private career colleges in the province.

The Canadian Armed Forces offer a wide range of education and career opportunities to young men and women. However, you must be a Canadian citizen to join the armed forces.

EMPLOYMENT

Youth employment is a major concern in Ontario. There are many organizations and agencies that assist youth in finding both part-time employment and exploring career opportunities.

YOUTH CRIMINAL JUSTICE

The youth justice system is separate from the regular court system. When youth between the ages of 12 and 17 break the law, the police can use different strategies to deal with the situation. Youth who commit crimes may get a warning or caution from the police or be referred to a community program. In serious cases, youth may be charged with a crime and will go to court.

GETTING HELP

DID YOU KNOW?

- You can apply for a G1 driver's license when you are 16 years old.
- You can apply for Ontario Works at age 16, provided you meet certain conditions.
- You can apply for the Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) student loans if you are a full-time post- secondary student.
- You can vote in municipal, provincial, and federal elections when you are 18 years old.
- You have to be 19 years old to buy tobacco products in Ontario.
- You have to be 19 years old to buy and consume alcohol in Ontario.
