NAVIGATING LGBTQIA+ TERMINOLOGY

The LGBTQIA+ community encompasses a diverse range of identities, and various terms are used to describe individuals within this community. Here are some key terms:

Sex

The medical classification of people as male or female based on physical aspects of the body. It is usually assigned at birth.

Intersex

A person born with biological and/or physical characteristics that are not easily characterized by medical definitions of male or female.

Gender

This is how we perceive our identity as woman, man, both or neither, regardless of our physical bodies.

Trans

An umbrella term referring to people with diverse gender identities and expressions that may differ from stereotypical gender norms.

Cisgender

A person whose gender identity is in alignment with their sex assignment at birth.

Gender Queer/Gender Non-Conforming Individuals who do not follow gender stereotypes based on the sex they were assigned at birth. They may or may not identify as trans.
