WASTE MANAGEMENT

Household Waste

Different municipalities manage household waste in different ways. Some local governments charge fees for garbage collection and provide special bins for garbage, recycling and organic waste. Garbage is waste that cannot be recycled or composted.

Most communities have **Blue Box** programs for recycling paper, glass, plastic, aluminum and other materials. Recycled items are used to manufacture new products.

Green Bin programs collect organic waste such as fruit and vegetable scraps, meat and coffee grounds separately from regular trash. The organic waste is converted to compost, which is used to improve the soil in parks and farmlands.

To get a Blue Box, or to find out if your area has a Green Bin program, contact your local municipality.

The Environmental Protection Act states that recycling is mandatory at residential buildings with six or more units. If you live in an apartment, ask your superintendent how you can recycle. Some communities may also have composting programs for apartment residents.

Electronics

E-waste includes items like cameras, computers, monitors, telephones, and televisions that no one wants or needs. These items should be recycled at a special depot. When you buy electronic products in Ontario, you pay an environmental handling fee (EHF). This money is used to pay for the cost of recycling or refurbishing electronic products.
